After the nomination process, we will contact you by email with new instructions about our administrative process included in a different guide (Welcome Guide), which also must be read cautiously.

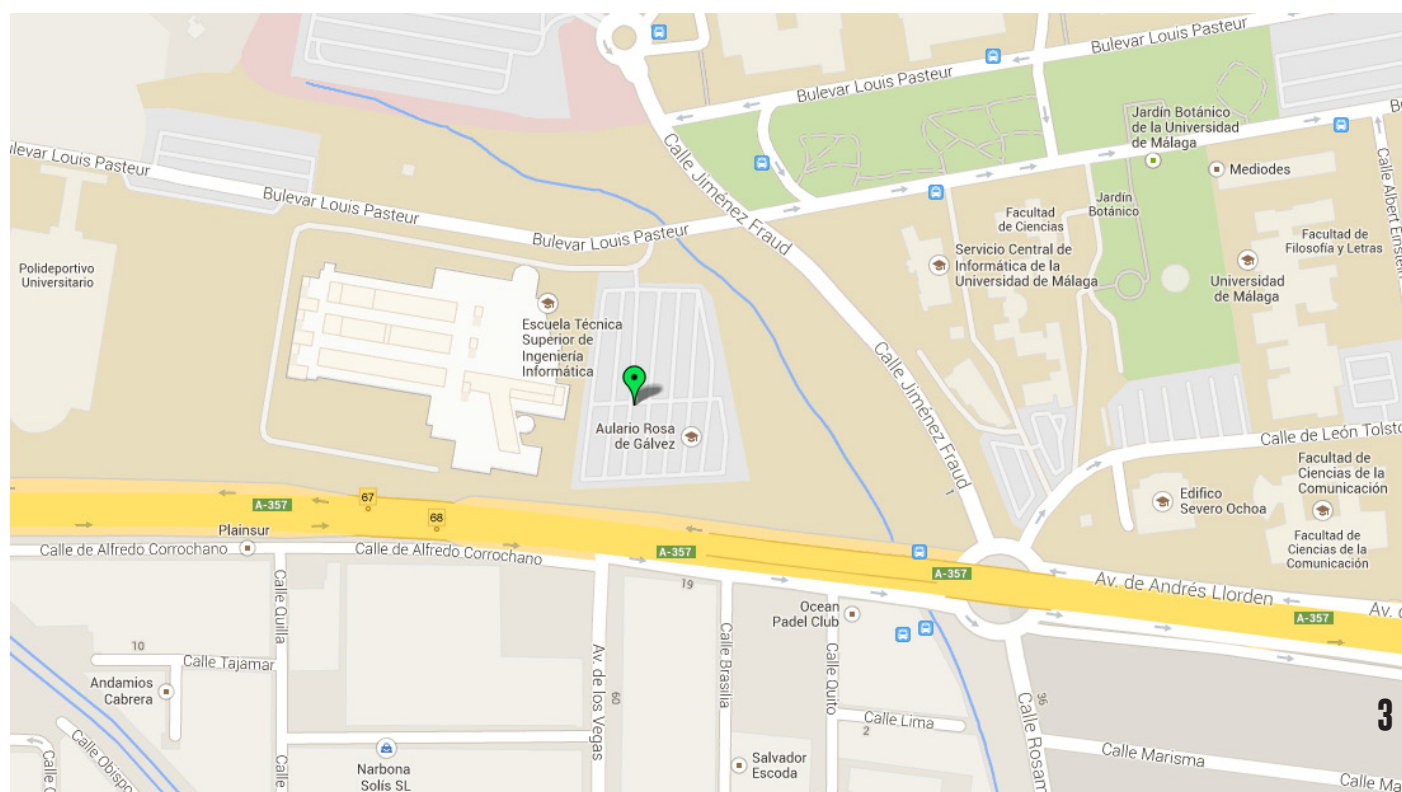

AN INTRODUCTION TO UMA

Universidad de Málaga is a young institution. This state-owned institution was founded in 1972 and has an annual budget exceeding 250 million Euros. With more than **35,000 students and 2,400 teachers**, UMA's study options comprises **60 Bachelor's programmes**, over **50 Master's programmes**, over **40 PhD programmes** and around 100 courses held throughout the academic year. These programmes are carried out by 18 faculties, with a total of 81 departments.

There are 278 research groups currently involved in 180 national projects and 30 international or European projects. In recent years, the number of partnerships with companies and other organizations has ranged between 350 and 400; furthermore, an average of 50 patents per year have been registered, a third of these having international relevance.

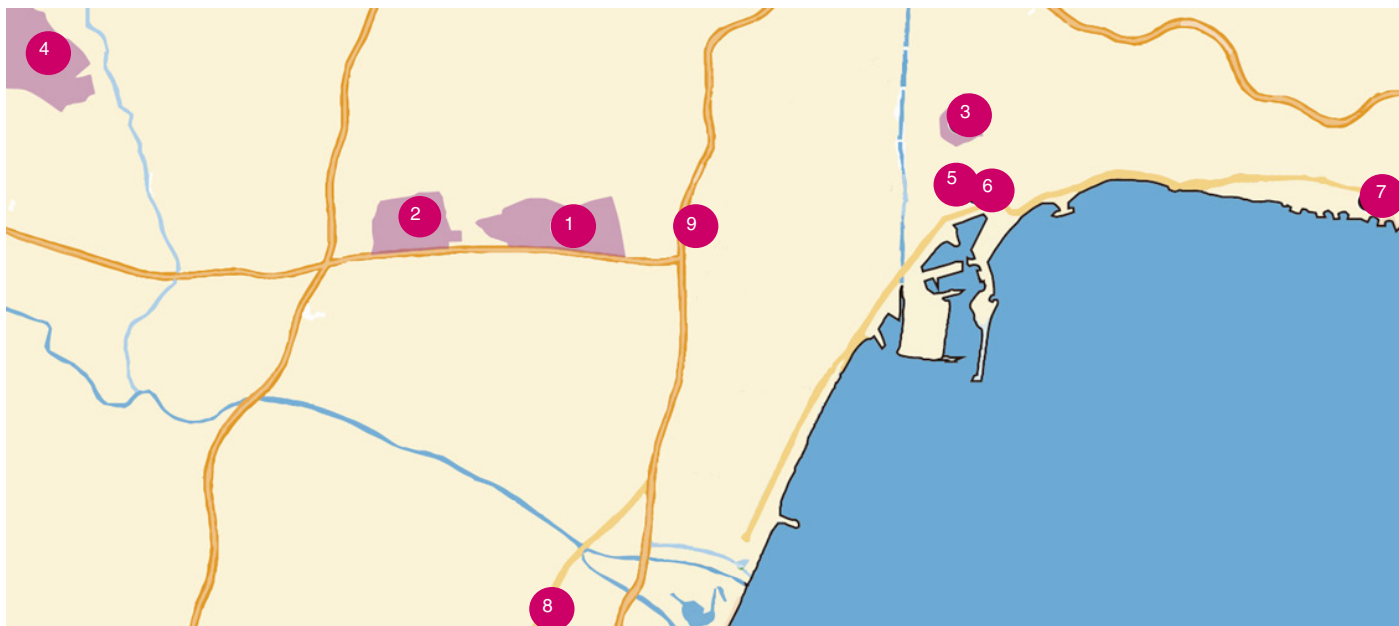
Each year our university welcomes over **1300 new international exchange students** from different mobility programs as Erasmus+, Erasmus Mundus or Non-European programs. We have a large amount of agreements with some of the most prestigious universities (especially in Europe and South America).

UMA constitutes one of the three vertices of the so-called "productive triangle" of the city, together with the airport and the PTA or Parque Tecnológico de Andalucía (Andalusia Science and Technology Park). The latter has close ties with the University due to the constant flow of ideas, highly qualified professionals and advanced technologies.

At present the UMA has two campuses, El Ejido and Teatinos, in addition to several other buildings located in different parts of the city. The ultimate objective of the policy of the university regarding infrastructure is to eventually have all university centres and services located in the Teatinos campus.



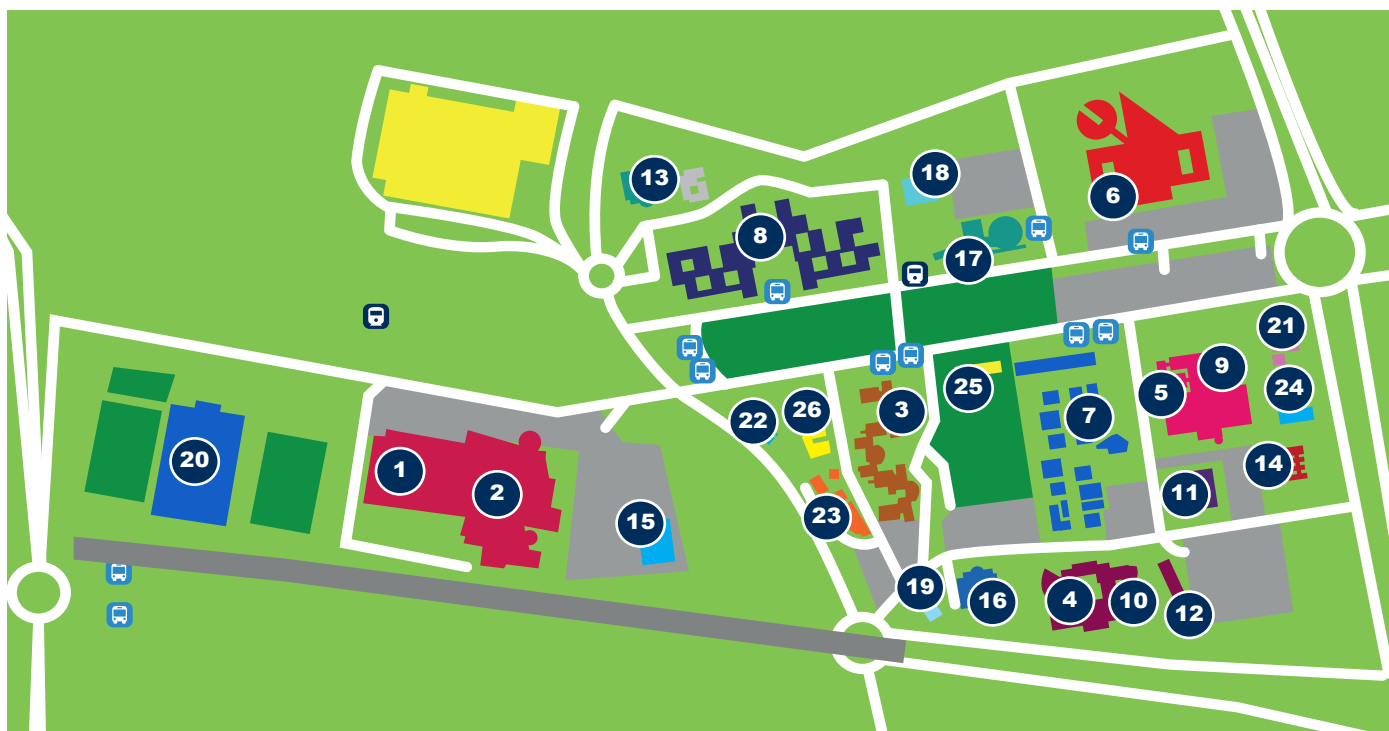

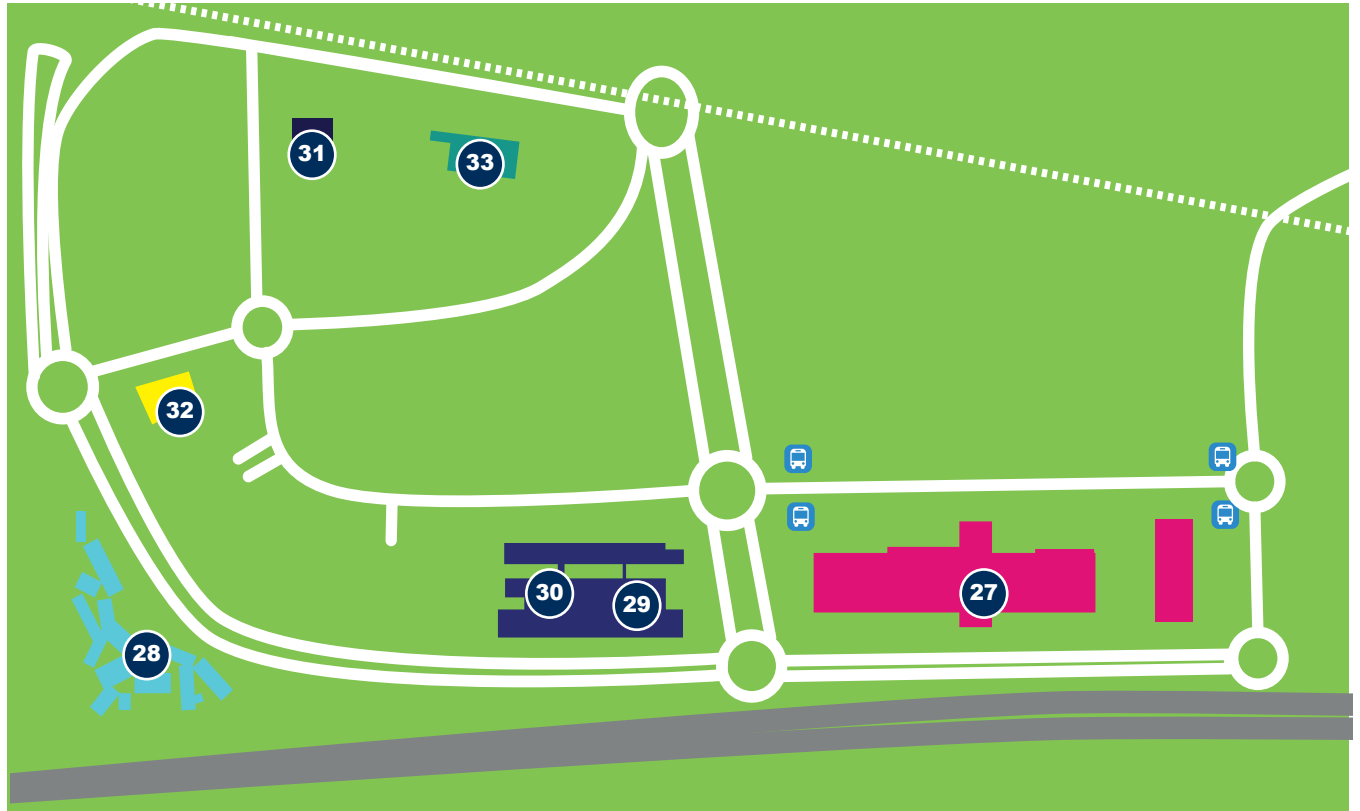

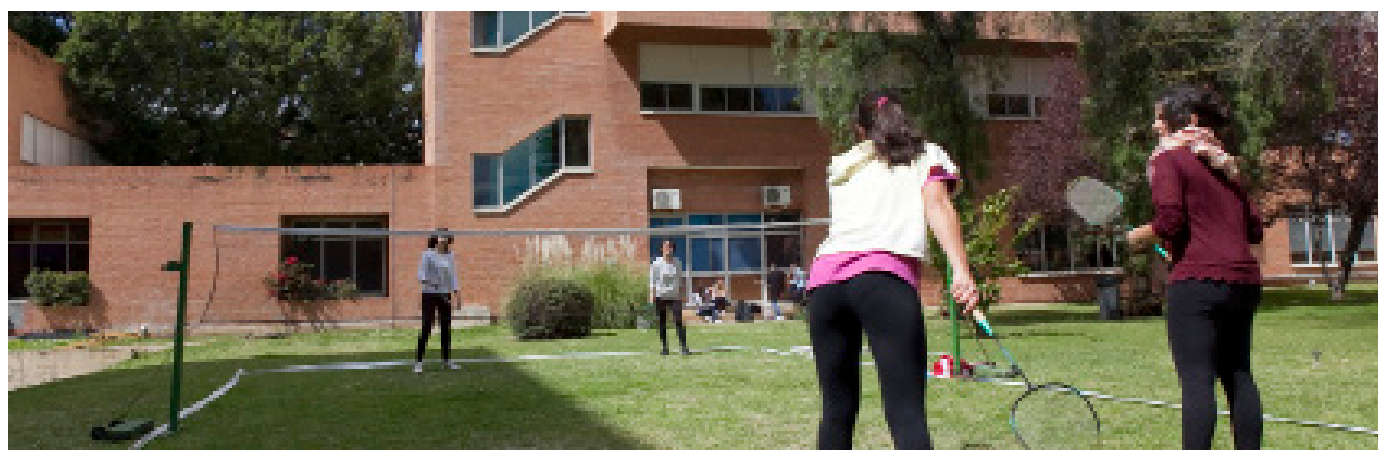

NOMINATION PROCESS

ACCEPTANCE AS AN INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE STUDENT

Requirements to be accepted

To be accepted as an exchange student, the following requirements must be previously fulfilled:

1. First of all, the home institution has to provide us, through our new Nomination Tool with the Nomination of Incoming Students selected to study at the UMA, together with their e-mail addresses (our main method of communication with students).

We will not accept nominations via E-Mail. Only students nominated through our new on-line system will be accepted.. Afterwards, we will directly contact the students, sending them the password to the platform by email.

2. UMA can only accept the number of students stipulated in our bilateral agreements and previously agreed on with our partner institutions.

3. For Erasmus and Latin American students **ONLY**, UMA cannot accept students from Fields of Study different from those stipulated in the Bilateral Agreement, since it can lead to problems. Please, consult this matter with your home Academic Coordinator.

4. We do not require any certification or a determinate level of language, although students are expected to be able to follow lectures in Spanish. In accordance with the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, a **B1 Spanish level is advisable**.

Nomination Deadlines

FOR EVERY EXCHANGE PROGRAM

- First Semester and Full Year: 1st June 2018
- Second Semester: 1st November 2018
- First semester, full year and second semester for:
Health Sciences, Medicine and Fine Arts students: 1st June 2018

Minimum period required

The minimum period of stay at the UMA will be **4.5 months**. This is the period necessary to complete the administrative and academic requirements. Students with shorter time will not be assessed and will not get any Transcript of Records.

There would only be exceptions in the case of Medicine, Health Science or Fine Arts students.

Once the nomination period finishes, selected students will receive an email with a username and password, as well as some instructions about the procedure to follow.

Students have to register online in our International Mobility Platform, EMI (Espacio de Movilidad Internacional) https://www.uma.es/programa_movilidad/incoming_pmovilidad/new/

This application procedure is compulsory.

Please, note that we do not require any hard copies or additional documents. The online application is enough.

International Students should:

- Read carefully this International Guide, as well as the Information Sheet for Incoming Exchange Students 2018/2019 (enclosed in the first email you will receive from us).
- Fill in the online International Application Form on EMI before deadlines (see below).
- Apply for the Spanish Language Course. If you mark this option in your online application, after the deadlines, you will receive an email, directly from the Spanish International Center (cie@uma.es), with the Application form and the procedure for enrolling.
- Once the application form has been completed, you must generate and save the PDF document.

Deadlines to register online

FOR EVERY EXCHANGE PROGRAM

- First Semester and Full Year: 30th June 2018
- Second Semester: 30th November 2018
- First semester, full year and second semester for Health Sciences, Medicine and Fine Arts students: 30th June 2018

Please note that it will not be possible to complete the online Application Form after the above deadlines.

ACCEPTANCE LETTER

Once the application form is finished, Incoming Exchange Students will receive an email with a link to download their Acceptance Letter with our signature.

The acceptance letter will be necessary for getting the student bus card. Besides, regarding non-European students some consulates requires this letter for the VISA.

In order to help students from **Non-European mobilities** in their visa procedures, original Acceptance Letters will be sent to their home coordinators once students are nominated.

ARRIVAL IN MALAGA



Airport

For students arriving at the international airport “Pablo Ruiz Picasso” (only 12 Km from MALAGA), there are three ways for travelling into town:

-A **taxi** costs between 15/22 € and takes roughly 15 min to reach the city centre. The rank is located directly outside the arrivals terminal.

-There is a **bus** into town every 30 min, line A. A ticket costs 3.00 €. The stop is located directly outside the arrivals terminal.

-**Trains** leave the station connected by a pedestrian walkway to the departure terminal every 30min, and a ticket to MALAGA costs 1.80 €.

Students are advised to carry some cash on them when they arrive in Malaga (50 € ought to be enough). Additionally, buses do not accept anything larger than 5.00 € bills.



Railway

Maria Zambrano Railway Station connects the city to the capital of Spain through the High-Speed line (AVE) Malaga-Córdoba-Madrid in a two-hour and a half journey. The Malaga-Cordoba-Seville route takes 1 hour and 55 minutes. Furthermore, the railway network connects the capital to other areas in Malaga located on the Costa del Sol, Valle del Guadalhorce, and the Airport through Malaga’s regional lines.

Bus Station

Malaga’s Bus Station establishes connections between the capital, Malaga’s municipalities, and the main Spanish and European cities. In addition, there is a Bus Station in Muelle Heredia, at the city centre near Malaga’s Port, which connects to several localities of the metropolitan area.



Arrival Dates

Students who wish to attend the Spanish Language Course:

- First semester students (3rd September 2018)
- Second semester students (4th February 2019)

Those Students who do NOT attend the Spanish Language Course must arrive at the very latest:

- First semester students (17th September 2018)
- Second semester students (15th February 2019)

INFORMATIVE MEETINGS

Upon their arrival in Malaga, Erasmus students and non-EU mobility students must attend one of the official meetings of the International Office in September (SM1) or in February (SM2), where the staff members in charge of incoming students will explain administrative and academic procedures. **It is COMPULSORY**, so that any international exchange student must attend at least one of them. These meetings always take place before the starting dates of classes. Please, check the dates of our informative meetings for this academic year in our Welcome Guide.

Those students, who will not be able to attend any of the two meetings, WILL BE responsible to consult and follow the administrative instructions directly from our Welcome Guide on their own.

SPANISH LANGUAGE COURSE FOR INTERNATIONAL EXCHANGE STUDENTS



The “Course for Erasmus and International Exchange Students” of UMA, 70 class hours, allows students to consolidate and acquire Spanish skills in order to improve understanding of the subjects that they will be studying in the University of Malaga.

This course is recognized as a non-official degree from UMA and it always starts at the beginning of September (first semester and full year students) and beginning of February (second semester students).

In this regard it is important to emphasize that, as a non-official degree from the University of Malaga, it grants ECTS credits that may be recognized by your home university but they **will NOT be included** in the Transcript of Records because the course **DOES NOT** belongs to any official degree program at UMA. The recognition of these credits depends on the home university criteria.

The intensive Spanish Language Course is voluntary and you can only enroll in one of the two periods.

If you decide to take the course, you have to select it on the online **Application Form**. After generating it on EMI, you will receive an email, directly from the Spanish school, with the Application Form and the application procedure.

ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

The academic programme for the academic year 2018/2019 will be published after the 1st of July 2018. The academic offer of the last academic year 2017/2018 may serve as a useful guidance until 2018/ 2019 the new one is published on the UMA website.

Once the academic programme is available, the pre-enrolment section will be activated and then students will be able to fill it in EMI. In this document, students should select those subjects in which they plan to enrol at the University of Malaga. This selection can be modified because it is provisional.

Details about academic courses offered at UMA are available online. It is quite easy to find the necessary information if you follow these instructions:

To find the description of each course

- Go to the main page and click “Servicios” on the main menu and choose “Ordenación Académica”. After that, you have to click on “Programación Docente” (right row):

- Choose “Programación Docente de Títulos de Grado”. (Here in after PROA)
- Now that you have found “PROA”, you have to choose your faculty, bachelor degree name and year (curso). Depending on your selection, you will find a different list of subjects.
- Select the subject on the left (in red color) and click on “Consultar la guía docente de la asignatura” on the left.



- You will find a different main menu and you have to select “Calendario” to find class schedules, rooms and exams schedules.

Different groups will be included on timetables. Students will be able to choose the group that suits them better, but it is important that they inform their professors in order to decide which group to attend.

Lectures in English

There are only a few courses offered in English and these are quite demanded. There is a limit of 25 exchange students per course and UMA cannot guarantee that courses taught in English will be available for every exchange student. Here you can find our courses taught in English for the [academic year 2017/2018](#) (the offer for 18/19 will not be available until July).

Please, notice that in that list we include the name of the courses in English but also translated into Spanish. When you have to select them on EMI, you will find those courses only named in Spanish.

Postgraduate Studies

For Postgraduate Studies (Masters and Doctorates) at UMA, this will **ONLY** be possible for exchange students if this option is included in the Bilateral Agreement.

Restrictions and rules established by UMA

- Non-European Students are allowed to study subjects from different faculties.
- Erasmus and Latin American Students, however, are obliged to choose, at least, 50% of the subjects relative to the Field of Study included in the Erasmus Bilateral Agreement signed between institutions (undergraduate and postgraduate level courses). Any doubts should be clarified at the home university before the selection of candidates. Students who do not fulfil this requirement will **NOT BE ACCEPTED.**
- Due to the Bologna Plan, the Lectures have limited places. Please, consider different options in order to have more possibilities.
- For Medicine students: it will not be possible to enrol in any course of 6th Year.
- Incoming foreign students who are going to carry out external internships in hospitals, schools, etc., must bring from the countries where they are nationals (if they have dual citizenship, from both countries), a negative certificate from the Central Registry of Sexual Offenders, or a criminal record, and failing that, a consular certificate of good standing.



LEARNING AGREEMENT

(Only for Erasmus+ Students)

Before receiving the password to log in EMI:

We insist strongly that our online system platform (EMI) will provide AUTOMATICALLY to the Erasmus+ student with the Learning Agreement's document.

We inform you also that using this online option, students will obtain automatically the document with our signature and stamp in order to send it directly to home universities. However, it would be provisional until getting the signature of the academic coordinator from UMA after arriving in Malaga.

Due to the huge volume of students that our institution receives each academic year, please **DO NOT send the Learning Agreement version from home universities by post or email**. Please be patient until receiving your password to log in EMI (International Mobility Tool).

In case that the Learning Agreement is urgently required, you can fill out your home version of the Learning Agreement under the supervision of your academic coordinator from your home university, who also have the details of your academic coordinator from UMA. However, please notice that in that case the Learning Agreement would be provisional and subject to changes until checking the availability of those courses in EMI.

After receiving the password to log in EMI:

Once you have logged in EMI, you will find the details of your academic coordinator in your Application form.

After you generate the pre-enrolment form on EMI (Table A) with the UMA subjects, click on Learning Agreement and fill in this section with the subjects of your home university (Table B), with which you will obtain recognition of what you study here at our institution. A PDF Learning Agreement document will be automatically issued with the provisional signature of UMA.

On the Pre-enrolment and Learning Agreement, you must respect the norms settled by UMA. As mentioned above, Erasmus+ students are obliged to take a minimum 50% of subjects from the main faculty in which they have been nominated by their home university.

Attention:

To avoid academic problems, those Erasmus+ students who want to do any internship or traineeship after been nominated through a bilateral agreement for Erasmus+ studies in Medicine, Health Science or Fine Arts (full year, first semester and second semester students) are obliged to send the Learning Agreement (EMI version) to the respective Academic Coordinator email address before the 15th of July 2018. The details of academic coordinators will be found on the second page of the application form in EMI.

LANGUAGE PROFICIENCY

We do not require any certification or a determinate level of language, although students are expected to be able to follow lectures in Spanish. In accordance with the Common European Framework of Reference for Languages, a **B1 Spanish level is advisable**.

Subjects at the UMA are taught in **Spanish**. Therefore, **those students who don't speak Spanish usually have difficulties to find the appropriate courses and to communicate during their stay in Malaga**.

Note: Special mention to the students from Health Sciences for the face-to-face communication with the patients.

CREDITS AND GRADING SYSTEM AT UMA

The European Commission has developed the European Credit Transfer System (ECTS) to help students make the most of their studies abroad. Basically, this system is a way of measuring and comparing learning achievements and transferring them from one institution to another. Likewise, it helps higher education institutions to enhance their co-operation with other institutions by improving access to information on foreign curricula and providing common procedures for academic recognition.

ECTS credits are a value allocated to modules to describe the student workload required to complete them. They reflect the quantity of work each course requires in relation to the total quantity of work required to complete a full year of academic study at the institution, that is, lectures, practical work, seminars, private work – in the laboratory, library or at home – and examinations or other assessment activities.

UMA has introduced the ECTS into all its faculties and schools. With this system 60 credits represent one year of study (in terms of workload); normally 30 credits are awarded every six months (a semester).

Maximum credits permitted

In accordance with the European Commission and the new System of European Credit Transfer, exchange students accepted by the University of Malaga are obliged to take **NO MORE** than 60 credits for a full year and 30 credits for one semester.

- 30 ECTS credits for one semester.
- 60 ECTS credits for a full year.

Note: As an exception UMA offers you the flexibility to slightly increase this amount and allows taking in the enrolment 36 (one semester) and 66 (full year) credits in those cases where it is necessary.

Minimum credits permitted

Erasmus Student

- 1 course per semester.

Non Erasmus Student

- 18 ECTS credits for one semester.
- 36 ECTS credits for a full year.

Your home institution sets the policy regarding the award of credit for coursework completed on an international exchange. You are responsible for knowing your home institution's policies and procedures regarding this matter.

Academic information of use to participants

- Number of subjects: Spanish students normally take 5 subjects per term.
- Number of hours per week: Students spend 20-25 hours in lectures.
- Number of weeks per term: 15 weeks + 3 or 4 weeks for exams.

The academic year runs from September/October to June (in some cases early July) with exams offered in February for the first term courses and finals in late June and early July for annual and second term courses which test cumulative knowledge of the entire course

Grading system

The grading system used by Spanish universities is based on specific attainment levels, rather than on a numerical scale. Notice that the grade “Matrícula de Honor” is rarely given.

STUDENT VISA



ACADEMIC PROGRAMME

Student visa is mandatory for any foreigners who don't belong to any of the countries of the European Union, Norway, Island and Liechtenstein wishing to study in Spain for more than 3 months.

The visa is processed in your country of residence prior to your departure. To find the closest Spanish Embassy in your country, visit:

To apply for a visa please contact the nearest Spanish Embassy or Consulate in your country. This should be done as early as possible and once you have the letter of acceptance from UMA.

It's important that you apply for a "student visa"; otherwise you won't be able to extend your stay in Spain as a student. The visa is affixed in your passport before you depart your country, and must be presented at the border Officials upon entry into Spain.

Processing a study visa

The application must be submitted personally, on the official form, in the Spanish Consular Office or Embassy in your country.

The application will be submitted along with the documents which accredit the following:

- A** **Valid passport** or travel document, recognized as valid in Spain, valid during the period of study which you are apply for.
- B** That you have been admitted by an authorized teaching center in Spain in order to carry out a full-time program which aims to obtain a studies title or certificate. This is the **Letter of Acceptance**.
- C** That you have the economic means to defray living expenses and return to your country according to the following amounts:
 - For your support, an amount which represents the 100% of the IPREM, unless you accredit having paid beforehand the accommodation expenses for the period of stay.
 - For the support of the relatives in charge of the student during the stay in Spain: An amount which represents the 75% of the IPREM for the first relative and the 50% of the IRPEM for each of the remaining relatives who are going to be part of the family unit in Spain. Unless it is duly accredited to have pre-paid the accommodation for as long as the stay lasts.

In order to guarantee this support, the amounts used or to be used to cover, where appropriate, the cost of studies
- D** That you have paid the processing fee.
- E** That you have **public or private health insurance** agreed with an insurer which is authorized to work in Spain.
- F** When the period of stay is longer than 6 months, you also will be required:
 - **Medical certificate** proving that you do not suffer from any of the diseases that may have serious public health consequences in accordance with the provisions of the 2005 International Health Regulations.
 - **Certificate of Criminal Background** in which it is accredited that you do not have criminal records in the countries where you have resided during the last five years by crimes foreseen in the Spanish order.

Important Note: If the duration of the studies does not exceed six months, the visa will be enough to document the stay.

Once in Spain

(Only if you are going to stay in Malaga for more than 180 days)

You must contact the local authorities to acquire a card called TIE- Tarjeta de Identidad del Extranjero and to get a NIE- Número de Identidad del Extranjero. Once in Malaga, you should go to the Comisaría de Policía in Plaza de Manuel Azaña, 3, phone: 952 04 62 00. You can find the instructions to follow here:

This “*Spanish Student Residency Card*” is then valid for as long as you are enrolled in the program in Spain. You could ask to get a NIE also if you come less than 6 months but it is not compulsory. ACCOMMODATION

Renting a room in an apartment shared with other students is the most popular way of living in Malaga. This option has reached a satisfaction of over 81% of the incoming students in the last final evaluation. There are a large number of apartments available for rent, which are situated in different parts of the city, and it usually does not take much time to find one.

The University of Malaga doesn't book accommodation for students, but it assists them in finding a room or apartment through its Welcome to UMA Office completely FREE OF CHARGE. You just have to contact Welcome to UMA and consult the accommodation offer. This will allow you to get in touch with the owners, who offer rooms/apartments for rent, and clarify all the details (booking, dates of your arrival, etc.).

LIBRARIES

To use the University libraries international students must have been officially enrolled since they will be required to present their Student ID card.

UMA has a General Library located in the Teatinos campus, and other libraries located in different schools and faculties of the University. The fundamental objective of all these libraries is to ensure that the university community has access to scientific information contained in published material in order to meet study, research and teaching needs.

General library services available to the academic community include reading rooms, with seating for 8,000 people, direct access to books and periodicals, check out system, bulletins (Boletín de Sumarios) summarizing the contents of the latest issues or volumes available, the Information and Reference Service (Servicio de Información y Referencia), providing access to dictionaries, guides, catalogues, etc., located in the general library via data bases, interlibrary loans and photographic documentation (Préstamo Interbibliotecario y Fotodocumentación); and lastly, user training programmes.

UNIVERSITY SPORTS CENTRE

UMA offers a wide range of interesting sports activities for sports enthusiasts of all levels. To take part in such activities or to use the university's sports facilities (or those belonging to the clubs that have signed agreements with the university), apart from being enrolled at the university, students only have to obtain a pass.

International students have to register to be able to do any sport. With your student sport card you can use the sports facilities.

Furthermore, teams from the university take part in federated competitions, national university leagues and the University Games. The Sports Centre is located in the Teatinos campus and consists of a series of modern sports facilities. The facilities cover an area of more than 76,000 square meters, at the centre of which is the multiple sports area, where different state-of-the-art sports units and equipment are located. The building also includes a swimming pool and a sports track, along with squash courts, bodybuilding room, gymnasium, dressing rooms and offices.

Its privileged position on the shores of the Mediterranean, its mild climate and the friendliness of its inhabitants have all meant that the capital of the Costa del Sol has, throughout its history, sustained excellent trade and cultural relations all over the world. Nowadays, Malaga is a modern, cosmopolitan and welcoming city with over 600,000 inhabitants, which has successfully developed its commercial, industrial and tourist sectors. The climate, the warmth of its inhabitants and the light, all contribute to make Malaga a wonderful place to live in.

WEATHER

Malaga is a Mediterranean city with a very mild climate. Winter temperatures very rarely drop below 10°C and in autumn and spring the average temperature is about 20°C, although evenings can be a lot cooler. Average rainfall for the region is normally quite low.

SHOPPING HOURS

Normal opening hours for small shops: 9.30-13.30 and 17.00-20.30.

There are many shopping centres open from 10.00 to 22.00.

Although shops are usually closed on Sundays, there are a number of small grocers and delicatessens which are open in the city centre during the weekends.

HEALTHCARE

Health Insurance

European Students must obtain the European Health Insurance Card before travelling. It entitles the student to medical treatment in Spain under the same conditions as Spanish citizens. They will need this European Health Insurance Card in order to register on the nearest Health Centre to their accommodation in Malaga.

Non-European students, before travelling, must take out private health insurance coverage from the date of their departure to Spain to the date of their return to their home country. This will provide the holder with medical coverage during their stay in Spain. Please, get the necessary information about your health insurance before arriving in Malaga.

Vaccinations

No special vaccinations are required or recommended before travelling to Spain. Students following a course of treatment should bring enough prescription drugs with them to last them their stay.

Chemists

Most chemists open from 9.30-13.30 and 17.00-20.30. Nevertheless, some establishments open from 10.00 to 22.00 and others 24 hours a day. When in doubt, consult the local newspaper or the list displayed in all establishments.

BANKING

In Malaga, as in many other cities, it is not a good idea to carry large amounts of cash on one's person or keep it at home. Therefore, students are advised to open a bank account on arrival. Banks are generally open from 9:00 to 14:00 pm weekdays. In addition, many banks have 24-hour automatic teller machines, ATM, that give you access to most bank services.

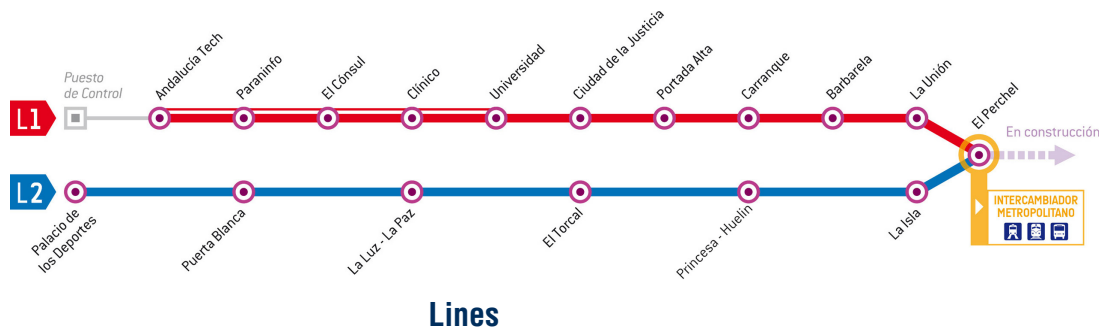

Students can apply for a monthly student card which enables them to make an unlimited number of trips within the city and costs 27 €. Only students under the age of 26 registered at UMA can apply for the student bus card. For those over this age limit, there are several other options: The “monthly card” which costs 39.95 €, allows a holder to make an unlimited number of trips within the city limits. Application Form and procedure will be activated upon the arrival of the student.

The cards are bought at licensed tobacco shops (estanco in Spanish) and kiosks throughout the city.

Fiestas

Several festivities are held in Malaga every year. The most famous and meaningful ones are La Feria de Agosto (August Fair) and Semana Santa (Eastern). However, there are other dates in which the city will be decked out and full of people: las Fiestas de San Juan, la fiesta de la Virgen del Carmen, Carnaval and fairs.

Gastronomy

Andalusian gastronomy is based in the Mediterranean diet: local and fresh ingredients such as vegetables, fruit, fish and olive oil. Our cuisine, and our culture in general, is the result of a convergence of cultures. Romans, Arabs, Greeks, Phoenicians and Visigoths all contributed to the history of the Andalusian gastronomy.

Tapas are small appetizers which are served in bars and restaurants throughout Spain and are sometimes included in the price of a drink. You can eat tapas that consist basically in anything, you can actually have a full meal with tapas!

Meals are served later compared with the rest of Europe: breakfast is normally eaten between 7.30 and 10.30. Lunch is served from 14.00 to 16.00 and dinner from 20.00 and 23.00. However, most of restaurants adapt their times to the European norm and will serve food earlier.

ENTERTAINMENT AND LEISURE

Picasso's hometown is more and more recognized as an important cultural destination. The capital city of La Costa del Sol offers a wide variety of museums and exhibitions as well as theatres and halls. You should not miss the opportunity to get lost in the history of our history and customs our learning about the finest international art.

Always a must when travelling abroad, Malaga has an exciting and varied nightlife. When the city centre's shops close, numerous bars offer foreigners the chance to get to know the locals.
