



Mobility regulations for incoming ERASMUS students

Below are the aspects that must be met by ERASMUS students who wish to carry out their international mobility at the Faculty of Health Sciences of the University of Malaga:

- Learning agreements must be reviewed and signed by the academic tutor responsible for the agreement and by the Vice Dean of International Relations of the Faculty of Health Sciences.
- International mobility under the traineeship modality is NOT accepted
- Students will NOT be able to enroll in subjects that are incompatible due to schedule. Only agreements will be accepted, except for particular agreed exceptions, in which, at most, subjects from two different academic years are taken, since the schedules or practices may overlap.
- It is recommended that the schedules and subjects published on the website of the Faculty of Health Sciences be reviewed, depending on the degree in which the student wishes to carry out the mobility: [https://www.uma.es /faculty-of-health-sciences/](https://www.uma.es/faculty-of-health-sciences/) without prejudice to any possible changes that may occur in the academic year in which the student begins their mobility period.
- Students are required to enroll and take the entire subject. It is not possible to partially study a subject. This aspect must be taken into account when completing the relevant forms regarding the duration of the mobility.
- The Faculty of Health Sciences reserves the right of reciprocity in case there is a high demand for applications to carry out clinical practices in some of the undergraduate degrees offered in this center: Nursing, Physiotherapy, Podiatry and Occupational Therapy.
- It is not possible to accept clinical internships without the home institution proving that you have passed the necessary prior skills to be able to carry out the requested internships.

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- Regarding clinical placements, students should note that the number of available places is limited. Therefore, admission to clinical placements cannot be guaranteed until the final allocation is confirmed. For safety reasons in clinical settings, it is essential that incoming students are able to communicate at least at a basic level in Spanish. In addition, they must have a sufficient level of English to ensure correct communication with academic and healthcare staff. Failure to meet these requirements may lead to the exclusion of the student from clinical practice activities. The Faculty of Health Sciences reserves the right to request official documentation proving the necessary language skills for participation in clinical subjects.
- Students intending to carry out clinical placements must be covered by a health and accident insurance policy that also includes civil liability coverage. This insurance must be valid for the entire duration of the placement. In accordance with the Erasmus Student Charter, it is the responsibility of the trainee to check that there is liability insurance covering in a mandatory way at least any damage caused by him/her at the workplace. Students must submit a copy of the insurance policy along with a sworn declaration—using the template provided by the clinical placement coordinator—confirming the accuracy of the information and coverage stated. The Faculty of Health Sciences may deny access to clinical settings if this documentation is not provided or if the coverage is deemed insufficient.
- It is recommended that students be immunized according to the current vaccination schedule and the epidemiological recommendations established for risk groups.
- Students must provide proof of the absence of sexual offence records by submitting the required documentation to the placement coordinators prior to starting their clinical placement.
- The incoming student must present, together with the learning agreement, a document in which it is accredited, by means of a signature, that: the incoming student knows the ERASMUS regulations that regulate the elaboration of the learning agreements established by the Faculty of Sciences of the Health of the University of Malaga, and that the learning agreement has been made in compliance with said regulations. Any anomaly in the learning agreement will be the responsibility of the student and, in the event of an anomaly, it will force a change to be made in the learning agreement that allows compliance with current regulations.

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- This regulation has been approved by the International Relations and Mobility Subcommittee of the Faculty of Health Sciences unanimously in the call held on May 15th 2025.

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
